### **Above The Hospital - by Beau Han Bridge**

Set against a relentless Vancouver rainstorm, *Above the Hospital* is a razor-sharp dark comedy exploring the paralysis, economic dread, and emotional dislocation of twenty-somethings navigating an unaffordable world. The entire narrative unfolds like a high-stakes pressure cooker, confined to a cramped, 350-square-foot Mount Pleasant apartment situated directly above a veterinary clinic—a space where there is ultimately nowhere left for the characters to hide.

The story centers on Lauren, an aspiring filmmaker, and her boyfriend Cameron, a full-time carpenter and frustrated musician who hasn't released a track in two years. Trapped in a cycle of financial strain, creative stagnation, and unvoiced resentments, the fragile stability of their relationship begins to fracture just as they prepare for a night out. Unbeknownst to Cameron, Lauren is suffocating under the weight of a devastating, deeply private grief, while Cameron is harboring his own impulsive, financially reckless secrets about his employment.

The domestic tension erupts when a colorful cast of eccentric, equally adrift friends arrives for a chaotic pregame gathering ahead of a Joji concert. The room quickly fills with competing egos and anxieties, including Mikey, a terminally awkward and heartbroken third wheel; Abby, a hyper-confident actor on the verge of a breakthrough; Bo, a Jung-obsessed, highly eccentric multidisciplinary artist; and Natasha, a fiercely cynical, couch-surfing radical feminist. A bewildered pizza delivery boy named Steve rounds out the room, acting as a silent witness to the escalating madness.

As the alcohol flows and superficial successes clash against bitter financial realities, secrets are aggressively stripped away. Masterfully balancing wit with existential angst, *Above the Hospital* exposes the friction between creating art and surviving inflation, exposing the desperate search for genuine human connection in a city that threatens to wash its youth away.
