About OOGA CHAKA!

Ooga Chaka is a comedy that takes the audience back into prehistoric times. Bungu and Kiki, two cave painters, decide to quit their jobs and create their own art form: theatre. Along the way, their show is endangered by Horp, an egotistical actor, and Rock, a rich producer. While Kiki wants to have fun creating art with their best friend, Bungu wants fame. It is these artistic differences that split them apart. Bungu and Kiki must then decide if they can put their artistic differences aside and rekindle their friendship.

Be advised that OOGA CHAKA! contains cartoonish violence and some strong language.

At the midpoint of the show, the cast performs a segment that consists of loud jarring music, bright lights and choreography that some may find unsettling.

Near the end of the show, one of the characters is attacked by a mammoth and has a tusk stuck in their chest. No fake blood will be used in this sequence.
